ITEM 6 Informational Item: RTF Proposed Bylaws and Legal Services Update

The San Diego City-County Reinvestment Task Force is an official public-private body that was created in 1977 by the City of San Diego and San Diego County to monitor local bank lending practices and develop reinvestment strategies that increase economic opportunity, financial strength, and housing stability for the region's low and moderate-income (LMI) residents. The RTF was founded to provide local implementation support for the 1977 federal Community Reinvestment Act, which was enacted to reduce discriminatory credit practices and reverse the destructive impacts of redlining in low-income neighborhoods and communities of color. In 2014, the RTF approved and adopted a set of bylaws to govern its operations. The bylaws were last updated in 2018. Staff will provide an update on the next steps concerning the proposed amendments to the bylaws and the related procurement of legal services for the RTF.
